

Lacing up for a good cause

On June 16, Clackamas Community College President Dr. Tim Cook laced up his running shoes and set out on a journey — running 1,500 miles across Oregon, connecting all 17 of the state’s community colleges.

An avid marathoner, his goal was to run to each community college, averaging 32 miles per day. The campaign, Running for Oregon Community College Students (ROCCS), aims to raise awareness about the challenges faced by students and advocate for increased state funding to support their basic needs.

At Clackamas Community College, 38% of students reported food insecurity in a survey this spring. They also shared challenges with affording child care and transportation. At the state level, a study from The Hope Center reported:

■ **Food insecurity:** Approximately 41% of students reported experiencing food insecurity.

■ **Housing insecurity:** About 52% of students faced housing insecurity, which includes difficulties such as affording rent, utilities or the need to move frequently.

■ **Homelessness:** Nearly 20% of students experienced homelessness, indicating a lack of stable and safe housing.

President Cook started his run at Treasure Valley Community College in Ontario, Ore. From there he worked his way across eastern and central Oregon, then south to Klamath Falls, up the Willamette Valley, over to the coast up to Astoria, down through the Portland metro



area and finishing in Hood River.

“Some have questioned why I’m doing this run and why I would subject myself to this, but our students deserve to be able to afford college and be able to pay for rent, child care, groceries and transportation,” President Cook said. “If this run helps raise awareness and funding for basic needs, it will be worth every blister.”

The funds raised during

the ROCCS campaign will be distributed to each community college, directly supporting students’ essential needs. To donate or learn more about the run, scan the QR code above or visit run4orccstudents.org.

This summer, I set out on a journey — running 1,500 miles across Oregon, connecting

all 17 of our state’s community colleges. The Running for Oregon Community College Students campaign has been my way of shining a light on something we cannot ignore: student basic needs.

At Clackamas Community College, 38% of our students reported food insecurity this year. Too often our students have to choose between buying groceries or textbooks. They also shared challenges with affording child care and transportation.

In just a few days, if all has gone according to plan, I should be finishing my final miles and celebrating by jumping into the Columbia River in Hood River.

As I near the end of my run, I have carried the stories of our students with every step. But this isn’t just my journey. It’s ours. I invite you to be part of it by advocating for basic needs funding, supporting our food pantries, or simply offering encouragement to the students in your life. Together, we are building a community where everyone has the opportunity to thrive.

Internet Basics is a beginner-level course for those who want to build confidence and use the internet more effectively. Topics include how to connect to the internet, navigate websites and internet privacy. It’s a great next step for anyone who has completed the Basic Computer Skills course or

wants to improve their digital confidence. Curriculum is taught over nine weeks through interactive lessons.

Basic Computer Skills will be available in both English and Spanish, with Internet Basics offered in English.

Ready for an unforgettable adventure? Clackamas Community College invites students and community members to experience the rich history, breathtaking landscapes and vibrant culture of Ireland through a study abroad opportunity.

From medieval castles to coastal cliffs, this 13-day journey Dec. 6-19, goes far beyond the classroom. You'll earn college credit while exploring Ireland through daily excursions and cultural experiences.

Each day includes a short lecture, followed by hands-on learning field trips — whether you're walking the streets of historic towns, enjoying local music or taking in countryside views. Evening events deepen your cultural understanding, making this a well-rounded and immersive experience.

You'll stay at the cozy Atlantic Apartotel in Bundoran in shared apartments with a kitchen, living/dining area, bathroom and free Wi-Fi. Stores, restaurants, a pharmacy and ATMs are just a short walk away. Some nights may include hotel stays.

From brainstorm to bandsaw: Bring your projects to life at the CCC makerspace!



Do you have a creative project in mind, but just need the tools, the space or maybe some guidance to turn it into reality? Come check out the Clackamas Community College Les de Asis Makerspace on the Oregon City campus. The CCC makerspace is the first of its kind in Clackamas County, a welcoming

workshop for the whole community. Create prototypes, models and masterpieces – or roll up your sleeves for some DIY repairs. Makerspace projects can include everything from building cabinets, constructing an Adirondack chair, restoring an antique fixture, engraving a keepsake and so much more! After proper training, participants have the ability to use makerspace equipment ranging from basic woodworking machinery and 3-D

printing to CNC milling, to plasma and laser cutters. The lab includes woodworking and construction, traditional metalworking and sheet metal, a welding and cutting station, digital manufacturing, electronics and sewing. Drop into the makerspace on Friday evenings to learn how to use the equipment. Bring a project, or even just an idea and get the help and tools you need to get started and make it happen.
