Minimum application requirements:

- At least 30 of the 46 credits of prerequisites must be completed by the end of Fall 2025.
- The remaining preparatory must be completed by the end of Summer 2026.
- BI 231 must be completed with a grade of “C” or better by the end of Fall 2025.
- Math Competency (MTH 095 or higher) must be demonstrated by the end of Fall 2025.

Grade Requirements:

- Cumulative GPA of preparatory courses must be at least a 3.0.
- Individual prerequisite courses must be taken for a letter grade and must be completed with a grade of “C” or better.
- AP/ IB/ CLEP credit cannot be used towards Nursing preparatory hours because all courses must be graded for GPA calculation.

Prerequisite Courses with a 10-Year Expiration: *(The last year accepted for the 2026 application is 2016)*

- BI 231, 232, & 233 Anatomy and Physiology I, II, & III: 12 credits
 - BI 231 must be completed by the end of Fall 2025, but not before Summer 2016
 - BI 232 & 233 must be completed by the end of Summer 2026, but not before Summer 2015.
 - NOTE: BI 112 & CH 112 are prerequisites to this sequence (MTH 065 or placement into a higher-level math is a prerequisite for CH 112).
- BI 234 Microbiology: 4 credits; must be completed by the end of Summer 2026, but not before Summer 2016.

- PSY 215 Introduction to Developmental Psychology: 4 credits
- WR 121Z & 122Z English Composition: 8 credits
- FN 225 Nutrition: 4 credits
- MTH 095 Algebra III: 4 credits (Note: if applicant has completed a course with MTH-095 as a prerequisite, this criterion has been met).
- Arts & Letters, Social Science, or Natural Science: 10 credits
 - At least six (6) of the 10 credits must come from the Social Science area. Remaining credits can come from any of the areas.
 - Courses must be taken at the 100-level or above and a minimum of 3 credits; courses numbered 199, 299, 180, and 280 will not fulfill requirements in this area

CCC Nursing Program Admission Selection Process

Phase I: Initial Application Evaluation

Applications submitted to NursingCAS for the CCC program will be evaluated on a 56-point scale (detailed on page 3-4). Applicants must meet minimum eligibility requirements (detailed on page 2). Only complete applications submitted by the application deadline will be considered. Applicants who score the highest in phase I will move on to phase II.

Phase II: Interview Process and Essay Scoring

Interview Process

- Interviews will consist of a panel of CCC Faculty/Staff/Students interviewing a group of about four applicants. Students who are invited to interview will be given an instructional information video prior to the interview.

Essay Scoring: *Essays submitted to NursingCAS during Phase I will be scored by a committee during Phase II.*

- Essay (Personal Statement) Prompt: The CCC Nursing Program understands that your application materials may not fully reflect you as an individual. We would like to provide you with the opportunity to share more about yourself as a candidate for this program. Please include the following in your statement:
 - What life experiences have shaped your decision to pursue a career in nursing?
 - Describe what makes you a unique and strong candidate for this program.

Note: Limit your response to 3,000 characters.

Prior to submitting your essay under program documents in NCAS, it is recommended to utilize the free [Grammarly](#) application to check your spelling and grammar.

Phase III: Post-Selection Requirements

Applicants offered a seat in the Nursing Program must complete all outstanding prerequisite courses (46 credits) by the end of spring term prior to starting the Nursing Program in the Fall Term. In addition, prior to beginning nursing courses, applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Successfully pass a criminal background check and a ten-panel drug screen from an agency and lab designated by CCC
- Submit proof of current immunizations
- Submit proof of current American Heart Association BLS certification for HealthCare Providers

Applicants should NOT pursue meeting the phase III requirements prior to receiving a seat offer in the Nursing Program*. Applicants offered admission will receive specific directions (at first orientation) from CCC's Nursing department on how to fulfill these requirements.

CCC Nursing Program Technical Standards

Clackamas Community College (CCC) provides the following description/examples of technical standards to inform students of a sampling of the skills required in completing the nursing curriculum and the provision of health care services. As a member of the Oregon Consortium of Nursing Education (OCNE), these standards are based on those required at OHSU, and the expectations established here align with those that will be expected of students transferring to OHSU for their RN/BS Completion. These technical standards reflect a sample of the performance abilities and characteristics that are necessary to successfully complete the requirements of classroom, lab, simulation and clinical requirements of the nursing programs at CCC.

All CCC Nursing students should be able to:

- Acquire information from demonstrations and experiences in the basic and applied sciences, including but not limited to information conveyed through online coursework, lecture, group seminar, small group activities and physical demonstrations.
- Acquire information from written documents and computer-information systems (including literature searches, patient information records and data retrieval), and identify information presented in images from paper, videos, transparencies and slides.
- Use and interpret information from diagnostic tools (e.g. sphygmomanometer, otoscope, ophthalmoscope, etc.), and other diagnostic information obtained during the course of a comprehensive physical exam.
- Practice universal precautions against contamination and cross contamination with infectious pathogens (e.g. wearing personal protective equipment, working with sharp objects and hazardous chemicals, treating clients with infectious diseases).
- Accurately elicit information, including a medical history and other information required to adequately and effectively evaluate a patient's condition.
- Problem solve and think critically to develop a treatment plan or plan of care.
- Synthesize information to assess patient needs and when appropriate develop a differential diagnosis.
- Use intellectual ability, exercise proper judgment, timely and accurately complete responsibilities attendant to the delivery of care to patients.
- Perform specific procedures and interventions (e.g. Basic Life Support techniques) sufficient to provide safe and effective care according to prescribed therapeutic regimens.
- Maintain effective, mature, and sensitive relationships with clients/patients, students, faculty, staff and other professionals under all circumstances.
- Communicate effectively and efficiently with faculty, patients, families, colleagues and all members of the health care team about a patient's condition as called for under the circumstances.

- Practice in a safe manner and respond appropriately to emergencies and urgencies.
- Demonstrate emotional stability to function effectively under stress and adapt to changing environments inherent in clinical practice.

We believe individuals with disabilities (as defined by Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act) are qualified to study and practice in clinically based health care professions with the use of reasonable accommodations. To succeed in the Nursing Program at CCC, individuals must be able to meet both our academic standards and the technical standards, with or without reasonable accommodations. Oregon Consortium of Nursing Education (OCNE)

What is OCNE?

OCNE is a unified approach to nursing education through a partnership between CCC, eleven Oregon community college programs and Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU). OCNE schools have a common curriculum, admission/prerequisite requirements and admissions timelines. As an OCNE partner school graduate, you can seamlessly transition with your AAS degree to the OHSU School of Nursing for your final year of nursing coursework to receive the Bachelors of Science (BS) with a major in nursing degree. This additional year of nursing school is offered by OHSU online (either full-time or part-time). Students must complete the AAS degree and pass the NCLEX RN before transitioning to OHSU. Clackamas Community College's Nursing Program is designed to provide students an associate's degree from CCC with the option of transitioning to complete a bachelor's degree in nursing from OHSU. The course work is outlined in a four-year framework (the pace of taking prerequisite courses will vary based on placement in prerequisite courses and can extend the student's timeline to five years for completion of the BS in Nursing).

Year 1: Prerequisites (typically takes students 4 – 6 terms to complete)

Year 2: Accepted 1st year Nursing core courses and clinical at CCC

Year 3: Accepted 2nd year Nursing core courses and clinical at CCC.
Complete AAS degree and complete licensing exam (NCLEX-RN) to become an RN.

Year 4: OHSU RNBS
Students complete additional upper division electives and nursing coursework to complete a BSN

PRE-APPLICATION CHECKLIST

- Meet with an advisor to plan prerequisites and register for classes
- Build your application to earn points
 - o Participate in community engagement
 - o Gain healthcare experience and/or a healthcare certification/license
- Research the field of nursing as well as other nursing programs in the local area

APPLICATION PROCESS CHECKLIST

- Apply to the Nursing Program* through NursingCAS (NCAS)
 - www.nursingcas.org
 - Select **Clackamas Community College**** when the application becomes available December 1st
- Send official transcripts to NCAS** from **ALL** colleges attended
 - If you are in progress with classes during fall term (prior to the application deadline) wait until grades are posted before ordering transcripts to ensure your fall grades are reflected on the transcript.
 - Submit ALL official transcripts, **including CCC transcripts**, directly to NCAS. NCAS may take up to 4-6 weeks to show receipt of your official transcripts.
 - Do not send transcripts directly to CCC. They will not be accepted and your application will be rejected.
- Pay application fee(s)
 - Pay the Nursing CAS application fee(s) to complete the application process.
 - \$60 for first application; \$45 for all additional applications
- Do not wait until the deadline to submit your application, transcripts, and/or upload supporting documents.
- Check the CCC Nursing website regularly for updates, application materials, and more detailed information.

*Note: Applicants do not need to apply to Clackamas Community College prior to submitting their NCAS application. It is recommended that applicants apply to CCC after Phase III.

Note: You must type out **Clackamas Community College when searching for the school on NCAS. CCC will not appear as a school option. Also make sure the URL has the year as "2026" and not "2025" as you may be using an old link if it shows "2025".
