College proves innovative amid COVID-19 crisis

Spring and summer courses moved online

Since their inception, community colleges have adapted to the needs of the businesses and residents in their districts. We supply a trained workforce to the business industry so they can grow, and we enable people to gain the skills they need to be successful. We are here to help.

Community colleges are known for being nimble and flexible to meet the changing needs of the community. As new industry needs emerge, we respond. These last few months with the spread of the coronavirus (COVID-19), community colleges across the nation have been challenged to change not only how we teach, but how we can help our communities recover from the impacts of COVID-19.

This spring, we brought as many courses as possible online. Our instructors were innovative and agile in moving their curriculum to online formats, including many hands-on classes.

In CCC's industrial technology department, teachers created their own instructional videos and online lectures, and tapped into commercial sites to offer these traditionally active-learning labs remotely. Students in industrial maintenance courses received lab equipment in a "lab in a box" format.

CCC athletics took their spring courses online too, including cross-training, weight training, Zumba, yoga and self-defense. Instructors showed their creativity in designing classes so students could participate from home. The weight training and crosstraining courses included workout plans, lessons on proper technique, the tracking and logging of workouts and activity time, and also space to share successes.

In addition, CCC developed online exploratory courses, which allow students to "try out" programs by taking a class that exposes them to a field, such as wildland fire, emergency management, criminology or public services. By taking an exploratory class, students can determine if that is a field they wish to pursue.

The college also worked to address student needs this

computers, and many faced additional financial hardships. The CCC Foundation and Associated

Student Government stepped up to help. Nearly 200 Chromebooks were purchased and loaned to students, and grants were made available for textbooks and graphing calculators. The deadline for scholarship applications was also extended.

As we move toward summer and hopefully toward the loosening of social distancing, the community will need to find a new normal. Many businesses have already closed and many more are suffering. Other businesses will be opening or reopening and

CCC breaks ground on new Welcome Center in OC

Clackamas Community College broke ground on its new Welcome Center in March on its Oregon City campus. This building will serve as the "front door" of the college.

The Welcome Center will house the following services: advising, counseling, education partnerships, financial aid, registration, testing and placement services, and a welcome desk. The college is intentionally creating a space where students can have most of their questions answered in one sitting rather than moving to different offices or between buildings.

The college is also remodeling the existing Bill Brod Community Center to provide a facelift for admissions, student government, the career center, disability resource center, multicultural center and the veterans center. The improved community center will create better study spaces for students as well as easy access to the Cougar Café.

The 21,000-square-foot Welcome Center will be completed in the spring of 2021 with the community center refresh being conducted during summer, and total completion fall 2021. Project cost is estimated at \$15.7 million.

"The Welcome Center will change the way we serve





students here at CCC," Tara Sprehe, dean of Academic Foundations and Connections, said. "We know that students currently must navigate between places to have their questions answered. And we know there is not enough access to study spaces or opportunities to easily collaborate and connect with students, faculty and staff. We hope these construction projects will solve these problems for students."

The Welcome Center is the last of the college's large bond projects. In November 2014, voters in the Clackamas Community College district approved a \$90-million bond measure that has been used to update and expand college classrooms and labs and modernize equipment to meet industry standards. Passage of the bond also resulted in CCC receiving \$32 million in state matching funds.

In this challenging time, the work of community colleges is even more vital, as we provide the educated and trained workforce needed to deal with the impacts of COVID-19. We are still here, and we will continue to be here to serve the Clackamas County community.

APPLY TO CCC

Visit www.clackamas.edu/ apply. Once you receive your welcome email, log in to Navigate to review your to-do

list, which will walk you through your next steps. *TIP: Log in to your myClackamas account frequently — it is CCC's primary means of communicating with students!

APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS (if applicable)

U.S. citizens and permanent residents: Apply at www.fafsa.gov. Undocumented Oregon residents: Complete the ORSAA at www. oregonstudentaid.gov. The ORSAA is for undocumented Oregon students, including students who have DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) status.

Apply for CCC Foundation Scholarships at www.clackamas.edu/scholarships.

SUBMIT PREVIOUS COLLEGE TRANSCRIPTS (if applicable)

CCC degree/certificate seeking: If you are transferring to CCC from a regionally-accredited U.S. institution, or if you have AP, CLEP, IB or DSST scores, submit your official transcripts to Graduation Services. Non-degree/certificate seeking: If a course requisite waiver is needed, submit unofficial transcripts to Advising & Career

Math and writing placements must be completed prior to registration. Visit www.clackamas. edu/pass for steps to complete your placement assessment.
