Scholarships spotlight

CCC awards hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships every year. This includes scholarships for working parents, for members of military families, for attending a district high school or for pursuing a specific career, like nursing or welding. There are even scholarships specifically for students who do not qualify for federal financial aid.

Get help paying for college

Starting college or returning to college can be a hopeful time. There is the excitement of planning classes, joining a learning community and taking a major step toward a future goal. For many students and their families, that excitement also comes with a worry - how to pay for it.

While taking the leap to invest in college can be daunting, support is available. There are many opportunities to save money on the way to earning a degree or certificate.

Many students who attend CCC are eligible for grants (free money!), scholarships (more free money!), loans, and parttime work opportunities that build experience while funding a college education. Emergency funding is also available to help students when the unexpected arises.

The strategies for paying for college look different for every student. For example:

- **Veterans** thinking about attending college can visit CCC's award-winning Veterans Education and Training (VET) Center to help them make the most of their VA benefits.
- **Students eligible for SNAP benefits** may qualify

- Lifelong learners age 65 or older qualify for tuition waivers to audit up to eight credits tuition-free.
- **Students changing careers** or entering specific fields may qualify for programs to help fund their education and ease their transition into the workforce.

CCC is here to guide students to find a strategy that fits with their lives. The Financial Aid Resource Lab at CCC is available to provide one-on-one help and answer questions about paying for college.

This year, nearly half of the scholarship applicants at CCC were awarded funding. The hundreds of scholarships offered at CCC can all be accessed through a single application, and students don't need perfect grades to apply.

Another way to offset the rising cost of tuition and fees is applying for Federal Pell Grants. These are a popular form of financial aid that can help eligible low-income students pay for college expenses like tuition, fees, housing and other related education expenses. Unlike loans, which have to be repaid, grants are a source

of free money. Only in rare circumstances does a Pell Grant have to be paid back.

Depending on the award amount and institutional fees, Pell Grants may cover the majority of the costs associated with attending community college.

• CCC had **1.640** Pell Grant recipients in 2019.

• In 2017-18 CCC awarded over **\$6.8 million** in Pell Grants to its students.

To apply for a Pell Grant and other federal financial aid, you will need to fill out and submit the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form. I know paying for college can be difficult, but it is the best investment you can make. If you are concerned about paying for your degree, we have the lowest tuition in the Portland metro area and can help you find ways to pay for college, like grants, paid work experience and scholarships.

This year, our Foundation is giving out a record number of scholarships, and the best part is you don't have to have a perfect GPA to qualify. We award scholarships to veterans, single parents, those who are the first in their family to attend college, and scholarships for those training for specific careers like welding or automotive repair. On average, scholarship recipients receive \$2,161, which is nearly half the tuition of a full-time student!

APPLY TO CCC

Visit www.clackamas.edu/ apply. Once you receive your welcome email, log in to Navigate to review your to-do list, which will walk you through your next steps. *TIP: Log in to your myClackamas account frequently — it is CCC's primary means of communicating with students!

2 APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS (if applicable)

U.S. citizens and permanent residents: Apply at www.fafsa.gov. Undocumented Oregon residents: Complete the ORSAA at www. oregonstudentaid.gov. The ORSAA is for undocumented Oregon students, including students who have DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) status.

Apply for CCC Foundation Scholarships at www.clackamas.edu/scholarships.



SUBMIT PREVIOUS COLLEGE TRANSCRIPTS (if applicable)

CCC degree/certificate seeking: If you are transferring to CCC from a regionally-accredited U.S. institution, or if you have AP, CLEP, IB or DSST scores, submit your official transcripts to Graduation Services. **Non-degree/ certificate seeking:** If a course requisite waiver is needed, submit unofficial transcripts to Advising & Career Services. Start college now! Students can earn college credit in high school

With Advanced College Credit (ACC) classes, students can conveniently earn college credit directly at their high school.

ACC is a partnership program between Clackamas Community College and local high schools. Classes are taught by approved high school instructors and the credits earned by students are added to their college transcript. Many classes apply to certificates and degrees at CCC or transfer to other higher education institutions.

At just **\$10 per credit** – or free for those on the Free or Reduced Meals Program through their high school – ACC classes allow students to get a head start on college while saving time and money.

Advantages students gain by taking ACC classes include:

- Earn both college and high school credit simultaneously.
