Clackamas County needs future teachers just like you!

Start your path to a teaching career in **Clackamas County** – and use your new skills to teach in a Clackamas County classroom.

With funds from the Grow Your Own/Teacher Partnership Pathway grant, CCC is building the **Teach in Clackamas program**. The program is designed to bring diverse teachers into classrooms across Clackamas County by providing career pathways for local teacher candidates.

"We want to recruit future teachers who reflect the cultural and linguistic diversity found within our own community. We are dedicating various resources to fully connect with aspiring K-12 teachers to help their career advancement," Shalee Hodgson, CCC associate dean, said. "This grant will give us the resources we need to successfully recruit and educate future teachers."

The efforts made possible by the grant are an excellent complement to the existing, high-quality Early Childhood Education and Education transfer programs at CCC. The grant funds will allow CCC to complete a Spanish language Early Childhood Education certificate and degree program, work with community and university partners on creating pathways for future licensed K-12 teachers currently attending school or working in local districts, and expand the statewide reach of the college's career technical education Licensure Prep program.

The Teach in Clackamas program will also focus on partnerships with Clackamas County high schools to assist students who are planning to become teachers. These students will be offered advanced college credits and connections to employment opportunities in local school districts while they complete their teacher preparation programs. Additionally, the college will work closely with the Clackamas Education Service District and university partners to assist currently working staff who wish to pursue a teaching license.

CCC is also launching a new Associate of Arts Oregon Transfer – Elementary Education degree this summer. Students who earn the degree can transfer with junior standing to a public or private university and pursue an Elementary Education bachelor's degree and licensure program. Through partnerships with local universities, the students are able to pursue their teaching passion locally — or transfer to the university of their choice.

CCC names new student services center after Clackamas treaty signer

Clackamas Community College is honoring the people whose land the college's Oregon City campus resides on by naming its new student services center the Wacheno Welcome Center. The building will house most of the college's student services, including advising, enrollment, financial aid, testing and placement services, and education partnerships.

Though the college wanted the Wacheno Welcome Center to be easily identifiable for students as an obvious place to get started, there was also a desire to demonstrate inclusivity in this building and to honor those who were on this land prior to the college. One wellsupported suggestion was to name the building after Chief Dan Wacheno, who signed the Willamette Valley Treaty of 1855 on behalf of the Clackamas people.

The Grand Ronde Tribal Council has a long history with the college having been involved in its Environmental Learning Center, collaborating on art projects, as well as attending conferences and summits on the college's campuses.

In a letter to CCC President Tim Cook, Cultural Resources Manager David Harrelson wrote,

"Naming the Welcome Center after the Wacheno family not only honors the first people of the land that Clackamas Community College sits on, it also follows the traditional cultural customs of the Clackamas as the indigenous people of this place. These customs include the obligations of the people of a place to be good hosts by

welcoming and caring for their guests. Naming the Welcome Center after the Wacheno family allows for this cultural teaching to be represented on the college campus named after the people and customs it will honor.'

"I am honored to affirm our ties to the Clackamas people, of which the college is named after," Cook said. "I look forward to continuing our relationship with the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde and educating our students about the Native

Americans who lived on these lands before us."

The construction of the Wacheno Welcome Center is part of a \$90-million bond voters approved in 2014. This project also includes the remodeling of the Bill Brod Community Center and is expected to be completed this summer.

Wilsonville campus serves as COVID-19 vaccination site

As vaccination efforts across the tri-county area gained momentum, a partnership was formed. **Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue**, the city of Wilsonville and Clackamas Community **Tualatin Valley** College came Fire & Rescue together to create a vaccination site at CCC's Wilsonville campus in February.

The site instantly became a vital resource for eligible people living a considerable distance from the Oregon Convention Center and Portland International Airport vaccination sites. Operations at the Wilsonville campus began by administering the Moderna

vaccine to residents 70 and older – and various frontline health workers as outlined under Phase 1A by the state of

Oregon. After administering thousands of vaccines

by March, the site moved to vaccinating groups within Phase 1B.

"We were proud to play a role in making the COVID-19 vaccines accessible to Clackamas County residents," CCC President Tim Cook said. 2 APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS (if applicable)

U.S. citizens and permanent residents: Apply at www.fafsa.gov. Undocumented Oregon residents: Complete the ORSAA at www. oregonstudentaid.gov. The ORSAA is for undocumented Oregon students, including students who have DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) status.

CCC receives historic donation

Clackamas Community College has received a historic \$5-million gift from long-time career and technical education (CTE) advocates Terry and Cheryl Holden.

The Holdens' donation of cash and estate gifts will benefit CCC students, veterans and career technical education programs into the foreseeable future. To acknowledge this generous gift, **the college will rename its Industrial Technology Center to the Holden Industrial Technology Center.**

As part of this pledge, the CCC Foundation is establishing the **Holden CTE Capital Projects Fund**, the first of its kind at the college, which will center on capital improvement projects and CTE initiatives. The gift will also provide scholarships for students in CTE programs, as well as funding to benefit veterans at CCC.

The Holdens have a long history and connection with Clackamas Community College and the surrounding community. Cheryl Holden grew up in Estacada and Terry Holden in Molalla.

When Terry Holden graduated from Molalla High School he received a scholarship, which had a huge impact on him and



made college accessible. Because that gift changed his life, he believes in paying it forward.

"Until then, I was still undecided in which direction I should follow," Terry Holden said. "A generous scholarship gave me a clear path and made my decision easy."

He still recalls that time in his life, and how receiving that scholarship gave him a deeper understanding of the importance of education. He said he knew one day he would create a scholarship of his own. In 2016, Terry Holden achieved that goal by establishing the CCC Holden Scholarship Promise, which benefits students from their hometowns of Molalla and Estacada as well as Colton. Since its inception, this scholarship has been awarded to 40 students.

"The Holdens have supported many worthy causes, but career technical education has always been at the top of their list," CCC President Dr. Tim Cook said. "Their affinity for affordable education and their deep love of their hometowns makes this gift to the college especially meaningful. Students for many years to come will benefit from their generosity."

START COLLEGE Did you know that you can earn college credit while in high school?

High school students can start college now by enrolling in **Advanced College Credit** (ACC) classes. ACC is a partnership program between Clackamas Community College and local high schools. Classes are taught by approved high school instructors and the credits earned by students are added to their CCC transcripts and count toward high school graduation requirements. Many classes apply to certificates and degrees at CCC or transfer to other colleges/universities.

Advantages of registering for ACC classes:

Convenience! ACC classes are taught at your high school, so you can earn both high school and college credit at the same time.

Save money! ACC classes are just \$10 per credit, or free

At **just \$10 per credit** – or free for students on Free or Reduced Meals Program through their high school – ACC classes allow students to get a head start on college while saving time and money. **Spring term registration for all participating high schools is open until May 28.** Visit www.clackamas.edu/start-college-now for more information. for those on free/reduced lunch.
